# Letter from the President

he Reina Sofía School of Music has been pursuing a two-fold goal for more than 30 years now: helping young musicians to reach their full potential and making music accessible to everyone. To do this, we have persistently adhered to certain educational principles that have led the School to become world renowned in this time: recruiting professors and students based exclusively on merit, extending the classroom onto the stage, the constant practice of both orchestral and chamber ensemble music, and a close relationship between pupil and teacher in an atmosphere that fosters hard work and creativity.

None of this would have been possible without the efforts and constant support of the School's Honorary President, H.M. Queen Sofía. By lending it her name, the School has also benefited from Queen Sofía's outstanding personal prestige in the music world. The contribution of the Spanish Government, through the Ministry of Culture (INAEM), and through the

Secretaries of State for International Cooperation, Digitalisation and Innovation is also essential. Also involved in the project are the Regional Government of Madrid, including both the Office of the President and the Regional Ministries of Culture and Education, the Madrid City Council, as well as the Government of Cantabria and the Santander City Council, where the School took its first steps and still carries out significant activities. This report highlights the key role played by our patrons both in Spain and abroad. They are the main parties responsible for supporting the School and its subsequent educational and social impact. My heartfelt thanks goes to them all.

During the 2023-2024 academic year, which is the subject matter of this report, the student selection process began brilliantly, led by maestro Nicolás Pasquet, for the 'Zubin Mehta' Conducting Chair, with the support of Aline Foriel-Destezet and contributions by magnificent guest professors on our teaching staff. In addition to our two lead conductors, Sir András Schiff and Andrés Orozco-Estrada, our orchestras were also led by maestros Goodwin, Afkham and Csaba, and the masterclass professors this year featured one of our most brilliant alumni: Vera Martínez-Mehner. Our 345 concerts, all of which were free or at a nominal fee, reached an in-person audience of 74,000 people and nearly 33,000 online. We reached a total of 1,226 alumni, who are scattered across the globe, spreading the benefits of music to everyone. The year also witnessed the preparations for the School's expansion to the adjacent building and the design of the School's introduction at Carnegie Hall in New York, planned for November 2025.

I believe that everyone who is part of the School – more than 300 people, between students, faculty and staff – has good reason to feel proud.

# Introduction

In recent decades, classical music has seen great progress in Spain thanks to the simultaneous efforts of numerous public and private institutions and thousands of individuals. The next step, which involves consolidating Spain's role as a leader in musical creation and education in Europe and around the world, will require something more: connecting these efforts organically within an educational and artistic ecosystem that operates under shared leadership. It is significant that, despite the clear transformative value of music, there is no ecosystem of this kind. While this is a shortcoming, it also represents a strategic opportunity.

The School of Music can make a substantial contribution to this task because it is particularly well-positioned to do so. It was designed as a shared institutional space in which public and private entities, as well as individuals, could work together on a joint youth and cultural project and, as shown in this report, that remains its fundamental purpose. Our Board of Trustees includes representatives of the Ministries of Culture and Foreign Affairs, in addition to members of

the governments of the region and city of Madrid, and we also have firm ties with other public organisations. The Chairpersons and CEOs of more than 40 highly reputable companies also belong to the Board, and we collaborate with many others in a number of ways. In this regard, we have begun to notice that, through the School, companies are starting to appreciate music, not only for its entertainment value, but also in more strategic processes, such as their own culture, talent and inclusion projects. In addition, with some 350 concerts per year, we are one of the leading producers of music in the country, which means we are in contact with an extensive community of performers, composers and organisers.

The School's vocation as a liaison is global in nature, as is music, which is an art form without limits. Our 174 students come from 38 countries, and they will soon be joining the family of more than 1,100 alumni who are filling stages and classrooms around the world with good music. We are also an active member of the European Association of Conservatoires, in which we have carried out, and even led, numerous European projects; our International Circle draws important figures from the business world on four continents and we regularly work with cultural entities in Europe, Latin America and the Near East. In a word, the School is —and aspires to become increasingly— a global network, a 'hub' of Classical Music and Musical Education that fosters a profound transformation in the way that music is taught, performed, composed and experienced in the 21st century.

The mission of the Reina Sofía School of Music is to support young musicians in their artistic and personal development and to bring music closer to our society.

#### **VALUES**

To fulfil its mission, the School is inspired by three values:

#### 1. Quality

Our aim for the highest quality education is what drives the School to train artists of the highest international standard, who are also committed members of society.

**Academic quality.** Teachers and students are admitted to the School solely on the basis of their merit and potential. Teaching is flexible, personalised and holistic, with an emphasis on a collaborative approach. The School is committed to intensive work from both teachers and students, with small classes and a large number of individual lessons.

**Artistic quality.** The stage is seen as a necessary extension of the classroom. Students are always performing at professional concerts.

**Management quality.** As an organisation, the School aims to be efficient, transparent and both environmentally and financially sustainable, with a positive working atmosphere.



#### 2. Social commitment

The School is committed to society given our consideration of music and music education as a basic necessity.

**Inclusion.** Free tuition removes barriers to access, while the principle of equity ensures that everyone receives the support they need. With more than 37 different nationalities among its 179 students and 87 teachers, the School embraces the diversity of backgrounds, ethnicities, genders, ages and cultures as an opportunity for mutual enrichment.

**Openness.** The School's goal is to have an impact on society as a whole, and especially on vulnerable sectors or those who find it difficult to reach concerts, working in partnership with social entities.

#### 3. Constant improvement

The School focuses on innovation within the sector and on developing the potential of each individual, rather than on a static understanding of talent.

**Growth mindset.** A continuous and healthy development of skills, supporting quality study and a customised level of exposure to the public, ensuring physical and mental well-being at all times. Aim for the best and enjoy the journey.

**Innovative spirit.** Digitalisation, entrepreneurship and innovation in terms of online education, concerts, audiences and careers.





# The School's challenge for the future



The transformation of the musical panorama today raises major challenges stemming from social, labour, technological and cultural changes that are defining our era and that to come. At the Reina Sofía School of Music, we understand that musical education must evolve to equip our students with the tools they need to face these situations with resilience and creativity.

The democratisation of access to music through new technologies has exponentially increased the potential audience and has considerably raised standards of performance. However, classical music is facing progressive eccentricity in the contemporary cultural ecosystem, hindering the creation of new generations of listeners and therefore affecting the sustainability of the sector. The growing precarity in the job market of the arts also demands education that combines artistic excellence with a broad, adaptable vision of the profession.

Aware of this situation, at the School we have bolstered our commitment to holistic training, in which instrumental excellence is rounded off with overall personal and artistic development. Our syllabus is constantly updated to focus on creativity, critical capacity and the exploration of multiple narratives, allowing our students to define their own artistic voice with a full awareness of their surroundings and their identity.

This year we have continued to expand the pedagogical tools we offer to our students, promoting a diverse range of learning formats and the development of skills that go beyond performance. Through awareness-raising and exposure to a wide variety of options and approaches, we strive to help students construct their own professional path with a flexible vision that is freed from the restraints of a misunderstood tradition.

Our commitment to innovation and sustainability in the cultural and musical world drives us to strengthen the connections within the sector and foster the exchange of knowledge and experience. An example of this is the new Chair in Conducting, which has so far united eight professional orchestras. As always, we continue to evolve at Reina Sofía School of Music, so that our students are equipped not only with an exceptional technical command, but also with sensitivity, critical thinking and the adaptability needed to cope with the challenges and opportunities that will define their musical careers.

Elías Canetti reminds us of the complexity and importance of our mission: 'The more mechanically life is structured, the more essential music will become. There will come a time in which only through it will we be able to break away from the narrow confines of duty; and preserving it as a powerful reserve of freedom free from influence must be considered the most important task of the future spiritual life.'

# The latest news from the School

The School is a comprehensive institution that trains top-tier musicians and develops their talent.

The Reina Sofia School features a staff of internationally acclaimed maestros, offering exceptional individualised training in which each young musician receives the attention and support needed at each stage of their learning, in order to develop their full potential.

Each student receives a syllabus that is specifically tailored to their needs and takes part in a demanding programme of chamber and orchestral music, including contemporary ensembles, historical performance and choir.

## We keep growing, adding new chairs

The School has also launched the 'Zubin Mehta' Conducting Chair, with the support of Aline Foriel- Destezet and under the leadership of maestro Nicolás Pasquet, starting in the 2024-2025 academic year. The four students selected will have a unique opportunity to collaborate in conducting prestigious Spanish and European orchestras, delving fully into professional settings like the Extremadura Orchestra, the Castilla y León Symphony Orchestra, the Navarra Symphony Orchestra, Anhaltische Philharmonie Dessau, Filharmonie Hradek Králové, and the Oviedo Philharmonic, among others.



## **Artistic milestone at Carnegie Hall**

The concert at Carnegie Hall in New York on 13 November **2025** will represent a milestone in the School's history, as the first event in a programme designed to strengthen the cultural ties between Spain and the United States, celebrating the 250-year relationship between Spain and America. Besides the **School's musicians**, other musicians from the Youth Orchestra of Colombia will also participate, as well as the Emirati cellist Elham Al Marzooqi, led by Andrés Orozco-Estrada, principal conductor of the orchestra, with violinist Renaud Capuçon as soloist.



# Learning with great artists. New additions

Each year, the School strives to offer its students the best education, so this year significant steps have been taken with regard to the School's academic ecosystem. Professor Juliane Banse and associate professor Christoph Prégardien have joined the School in a new stage of the 'Alfredo Kraus' Fundación Ramón Areces Voice Chair. Professor Simon Halsey has also joined the choir singing programme, which is important in the education of any musician.





# We develop new skills for training well-rounded, versatile musicians

One of the most important academic changes in the 2023-2024 academic year has been the development of a new skills area for musicians, the 'Lifelong Learning Area', which encompasses several existing and newly created programmes:

Alumni, Artistic Development, Entrepreneurship and Social Innovation Programme and the School's Project Incubator.

The aim is to accompany students in their professional development, rounding off their technical and musical training with skills like leadership, management, entrepreneurship and communication, in addition to offering professional guidance and a programme with a wide range of internships to prepare them for the challenges of their career.

The new **Artistic Development** subject introduces our students to basic concepts of entrepreneurship, cultural management and social impact, laying the groundwork for the Entrepreneurship and Social Innovation Programme in later academic years. This extra-musical education, which is open to alumni, aims to energise the creative and entrepreneurial ecosystem of classical music.

The holistic training of a musician is not complete without tools for taking care of their mental health. The new **Psychology for Performers Programme** offers resources and training to cope with the demands of our students' musical careers, in addition to offering direct mentoring where necessary.

The Entrepreneurship and Social Innovation Programme and the School's Project Incubator receive support from Fundación Banco Sabadell and If! Foundation, and Alumni receive support from If! Foundation. In turn, Artistic Development and the Psychology for Performers Programme receive support from Edmond de Rothschild Family Philanthropy.



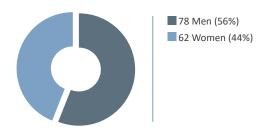

## Demographics of the School's 140 students



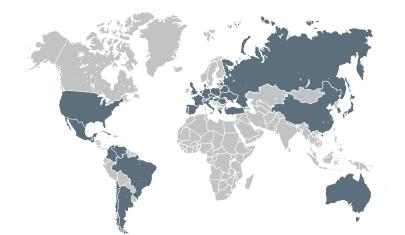


### **Geographic origin**

# International Institute of Chamber Music of Madrid

**Chamber music** is a first-rate factor of progress in a musician's training and in the artistic life of a society. Therefore, the Institute was created nearly twenty years ago to forge a hub of top-tier chamber activity with an international focus in the artistic and academic life of Madrid.

The Institute is aimed at students who have completed or are completing their higher education, with the aim of providing them with all the knowledge needed for comprehensive training: **interpretative ability across all styles**, **ability to integrate into ensembles of the most diverse formats and development of the leadership role**.

The ensembles in the String Department are selected each year through an open audition process. The Piano and Wind Ensembles train with students from the School.

Throughout the year, their work is presented in the Da Camara series at the Sony Auditorium. In the 2023-2024 academic year, **17 concerts by professor Günter Pichler's String Quartet Department** were held, along with 2 extraordinary concerts by the Société Generale Historical Performance Department and the School's Baroque Ensemble led by professor Paul Goodwin. The Institute's 2023-2024 Academic Year Closing Concert was also held as part of the Santander Encounter of Music and Academy.

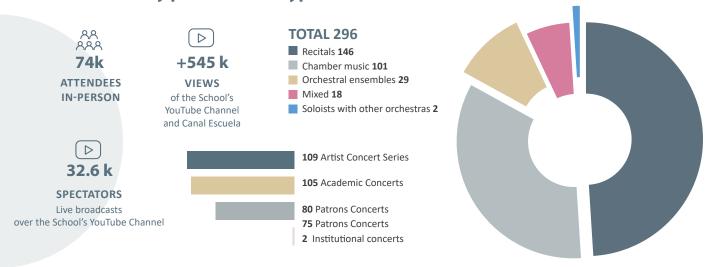


# Our concerts in numbers

The School offers around 300 concerts each year, because learning on stage is one of the key principles of our pedagogical concept.

One of our main objectives is to incorporate artistic activity into the curriculum, so that students may experience a reality that will be fundamental in their future career: contact with the public. This year, the students at our School have performed in 296 concerts, by way of recitals, chamber music, mixed and orchestral ensembles and soloists with other orchestras. In addition to these concerts, there were also 49 scheduled for the Santander Encounter of Music and Academy that takes place in July in Cantabria (see p. 47).

# >>> Auditorium and venues

We have held 101 concerts in diverse auditoriums, theatres, cathedrals, palaces, museums, churches, outdoor spaces, etc., aimed at bringing music closer to everyone, so they can enjoy classical music in the most emblematic, historical venues in our country. We have also scheduled 195 concerts at our Sony Auditorium.



During the 2023-2024 academic year, **296 concerts** were held at **75 venues** in **37 cities** in Colombia and Spain.



# During this academic year

The School's artistic activities continue to progress with the same vitality as always, because this is one of the cornerstones of our educational concept: we believe the stage is a necessary extension of the classroom. Through our extensive artistic scheduling, we offer our students an enriching stage experience, with nearly 300 concerts per year and an average of 20 performances per student.

Major concerts and series were organised this year, such as the Telefónica Centenary Concert Series, which brought the best classical music to emblematic places in Spain, and the 'Midday Suite' Series, to name just a few of the numerous events in diverse formats.

### >>> Concert series

# Cremona Week in Madrid

The Reina Sofía School of Music, the Stauffer Foundation, the Cremona Liutai Consortium of Antonio Stradivari Violinmakers and Le Dimore del Quartetto held the 'Cremona Week in Madrid'. Cremona, a town in Italy that is famous for its traditional violinmaking craft, visited Madrid in March 2024, where chamber music and string instruments took centre stage.

The Rilke and Goldberg quartets of the Stauffer Foundation, a private Italian institution devoted to training professional string musicians and promoting musical culture, took part in the string quartet lessons taught by Günter Pichler, ending on a high note with two concerts on 8 March in the Da Camera series. The Rilke Quartet also played the so-called 'Quartetto del Consorzio' instruments, created to mark the 25<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the Cremona Violinmakers Consortium and currently owned by the Stauffer Foundation.

In addition to the live music that could be heard throughout the week, an exhibition of string instruments lent by the Cremona **Consortium of Antonio Stradivari Violinmakers** was also on display. **Giorgio Grisales**, president of the Consortium and master violinmaker, gave a talk and workshop for the School's young musicians about the art of violinmaking and the care and maintenance of string instruments.





# 23<sup>rd</sup> Santander Encounter of Music and Academy

The Santander Encounter of Music and Academy was born in 2001 as a project to promote both the **Cantabrian Government** and **Fundación Albéniz**, organised by the School in collaboration with **Santander City Council**. Twenty-three years later, thanks to the support of public and private institutions, it is now well-established in line with its initial objectives: to support young musicians, to bring music closer to everyone, to enrich the supply of music in the Cantabrian region and, above all, to strengthen the position of Santander and Cantabria as landmark places in the international music scene.

Throughout the month of July 2024, the Santander Encounter of Music and Academy brought together 14 acclaimed maestros and 69 young musicians, selected by the artistic director, Péter Csaba, following thorough auditions at fifteen prestigious European schools. This partnership has enabled maestros and students to work together in the classroom and to share the stage, offering an enriching interaction and presenting a diverse international repertoire.

This programme, created by and for music, is designed with the aim of developing music-related skills such as active listening and instrumental technique, both individually and with others. It also fosters fundamental values such as responsibility, dedication and teamwork.

Participants from all over the world had an opportunity to register for this unique week-long experience, the finishing touch of which is always the special 'Young Artists Summer Camp' concert for families. In this final concert, the young artists share their musical achievements and show off what they have learned on the Sony Auditorium stage.

# Scholarship programme

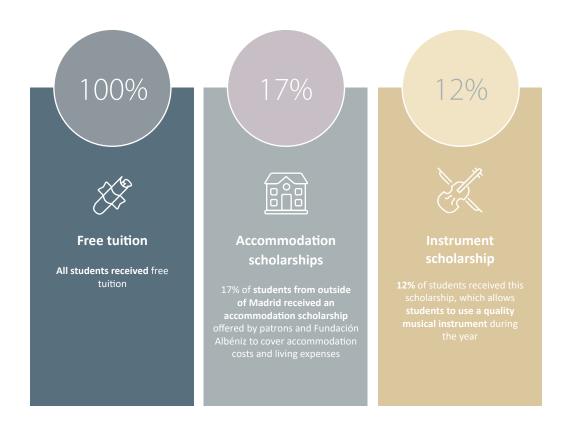
All the students at the Reina Sofía School of Music enjoy free tuition.

The admissions process consists of demanding auditions in which the selection criteria are based solely on artistic potential. With a 10% admission rate, the School is positioned as an international benchmark for young musicians.

Many students come from families with limited resources or developing countries, and our free tuition system enables them to reach their maximum potential, regardless of their financial situation.

# Our Alumni network

# We accompany our alumni after they finish school

As part of an innovative educational model in the musical field, the Reina Sofía School strives to support an active, dynamic alumni network. The School not only educates students until they earn their degree, but also offers them ongoing support after they finish their studies, ensuring constant mentoring throughout their career and encouraging lifelong learning.

The School has developed the 'We are School' programme, which offers its community of graduates artistic opportunities, jobs, continuous training and meetings with professionals, among others. The goal is for our alumni to continue contributing to the School's founding mission: training musicians and bringing music closer to society throughout their entire career.

Former students of the School form part of a community of more than 1,200 musicians. The School's Alumni Programme, with support from If! Foundation, also encourages students from different generations to meet with one another, forming a creative line of interaction and collaboration between artists, while fostering their role as ambassadors of the School in the world. In May 2024, the Entrepreneurship and Innovation Alumni Reunion was held and in September 2024, the School arranged the 1st International Ibero-American Alumni Reunion.

# >>> New professional development services

During the 2023-2024 academic year, the School implemented new professional development services such as job advising, orientation and continuous training, including:

**Cross-generational connections and networking**: fostering the creation of an active network of graduates, promoting contact amongst different generations of alumni and building a strong, enriching professional network.

**Lifelong learning:** we offer lifelong learning courses that provide tools in addition to musical training, helping graduates improve their job opportunities and staying up to date in their field.

**Employability and professional support**: we provide information about scholarships, accommodation, job opportunities and key resources to finding a job, such as the *Project Incubator*.

**Research and refresher courses**: we follow our graduates' journeys to gain an accurate picture of the professional world, which helps us focus the design of our range of programmes and adapt it to market needs.

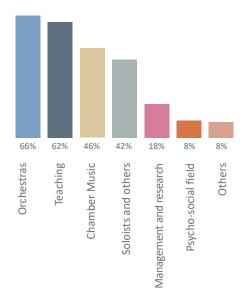

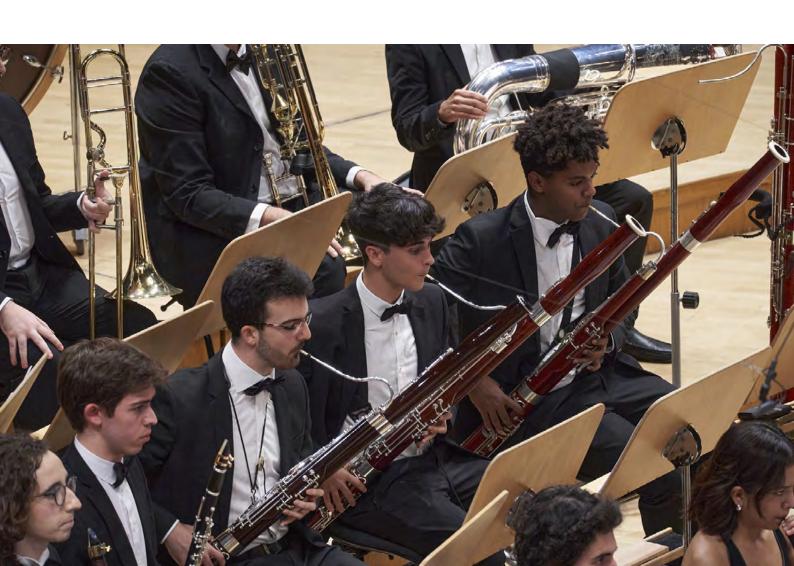

# Social impact projects

The Entrepreneurship and Social Innovation Programme and the diverse projects carried out in conjunction with our patrons offer our students the opportunity to delve deeper into the social function of music, exploring new ways of holding concerts and connecting with the audience.

# **Entrepreneurship and Social Innovation Programme**

In its commitment to constantly improving its range of programmes and preparing its students for their future careers, the School created the Entrepreneurship Programme in the 2016-2017 academic year, which is now implemented through its partnership with **Fundación Banco Sabadell and If! Foundation.** 



**Festival Múndica**: a world music festival in San Lorenzo del Escorial combining interactive workshops with students and public concerts to show cultural diversity through music.

**MEPA - Ecological Music for Adolescents**: a social and artistic programme for the collective creation of a sound piece with 14- and 15-year-old adolescents in a public secondary school.

**Melodies of memory**: workshops and a concert with the elderly (70-90 years old) in the San Cristóbal de los Ángeles district of Madrid, where there are limited resources and few cultural activities.

**Sinfonía Interior**: audio-visual project on the mental and physical health of Conservatoire of Music students, to raise awareness about the health implications of a career in music.

**Ars Nova**: a project that promotes contemporary music among young people between the ages of 18 and 30 over social media such as Instagram and TikTok.

# **>>> Education projects**

#### **Fundación Banco Santander Programme for Schoolchildren**

For 25 years now, educational concerts have been offered for primary and secondary schoolchildren at the National Auditorium of Music, and during this time the School has adapted to the times and the changes. Therefore, Virtual Reality (VR) was added to the Concerts for Schoolchildren Series back in 2020 through an immersive experience that combined music and technology.

This year, to celebrate this 25<sup>th</sup> edition, innovation was present in both the workshops and the educational concerts, with two aims:

- To expand the scope of the project
- To innovate in the live concert format

# Project Vivaldi 3.0: a virtual reality project

In addition to the 'Music with All Five Senses' workshops, the project 'Vivaldi 3.0. The Immersive Universe of the Four Seasons by Vivaldi' was also launched this year, in which Ara Malikian and the School's String Orchestra participate. It involves a virtual reality experience produced by Carlos J. Ochoa Fernández and ONE XR Studio, in which the audience can enjoy Vivaldi's 'Four Seasons' surrounded by a magical forest that comes to life and is transformed in each season.





### 360 Music in the mountains of Madrid: an immersive, didactic experience

### >>> Project for audiences

With support from the Regional Ministry of Culture, Tourism and Sports of Madrid, 'Audiencias in Crescendo', a project in the 30<sup>th</sup> edition of the Rising Generation series, seeks to restore the relationship with the audience through active mediation and the use of technology. It features internationally acclaimed young soloists and encourages audience participation as co-creators in the musical experience. Project highlights include its accessibility, innovation and artistic quality, thus boosting its reputation as a cultural proposal with a strong impact in the Region of Madrid.

'Audiencias in Crescendo' not only aims to bring classical music to a diverse public, but also to ensure that the cultural experience is inclusive and accessible for all. Through its mediation approach, the project fosters active audience participation, transforming it from a passive role to a proactive one, in which each spectator becomes a main character in the artistic process.



# Diversity and inclusion

The Reina Sofía School's core objectives include a commitment to diversity and inclusion, understood in a crosscutting sense. We believe in the transformative power of music, not only as a tool for healing but also as a driver of personal development and social change. We are committed to taking music beyond concert halls, working with diverse communities to address complex social needs. We use music as a universal language that transcends cultural and socio-economic borders.

### >>> Academy for Impact through Music

During the 2023-2024 academic year, the Reina Sofía School continued to work with AIM, the Academy for Impact through Music, an international organisation focusing on the development of musical agents of change and their impact as social programme teachers around the world. Two School alumni, Jessica María Rueda and Mika Nishimura, were chosen for the innovative AIM Firebird Fellowship, taking part in the residency that AIM organised in August 2023 in Lisbon, along with a selection of 40 other young professionals from around the world.





# >>> Partnerships for inclusion

In this sense, the School has signed collaboration agreements with several entities to ensure diversity and inclusion among artists, among audiences and also among the School's staff:

Fundación Grupo SIFU: This entity granted a scholarship for the 2024 Summer Camp to a participant with Down's Syndrome.

Acerca Cultura: with the aim of facilitating access to culture for people in vulnerable situations in conjunction with social organisations, the School has joined this initiative to help these groups gain access to its programme of concerts.

Specialisterne to include people with autism, Asperger syndrome and other types of neurodiversity in the workplace, promoting their education and employment opportunities.

# European partnerships and projects

In keeping with its objectives and its **commitment to sustainability and social development**, the School is an active member of a **global network of domestic and international institutions**, participating in projects aimed at promoting musical education and tackling the challenges faced by young musicians and society as a whole.

We believe in the importance of creating strategic alliances with organisations to promote a dynamic, professional cultural model in which culture acts as a driver of identity, inclusion and social transformation. The School currently has more than 200 alliances in place, through which it has developed collaborative activities and projects that are aligned with SDG 17, which promotes the creation of global partnerships to achieve shared goals and progress in education, culture and social cohesion. Below we have highlighted just a few of the projects and activities in which the School took part during the year:

**AEOS:** ÁGORA 2024 conference, held in Madrid in February 2024, in which leading professionals in the musical field in Europe met for three days to discuss the challenges of classical music in today's society. Organised by the Spanish Association of Symphony Orchestras (AEOS) in collaboration with Festclásica, GEMA, Ópera XXI and ROCE. The event provided a space for exchanging ideas. Speakers included Òscar Colomina i Bosch, the dean of our School.



Digital Skills 4 Music Teachers (DISK): this is a project designed with the aim of contributing to the digitalisation of music education in Europe. It addresses a gap detected in music teacher education, specifically in the field of technology and the pedagogical skills needed for a different teaching environment influenced by new technologies. This is an Erasmus+ project funded by the European Union through SEPIE (Spanish Service for the Internationalisation of Education), led by the School in partnership with Munster Technological University (Ireland), University of Tartu Viljandi Culture Academy (Estonia) and Grupo DEX (Spain).

FilantropIA sin Fronteras: an event organised by Fundación Empresa y Sociedad, in partnership with Transnational Giving Europe and the Reina Sofía School, which took place in the Auditorium and is aimed at broadening horizons in the philanthropic ecosystem in Spain, discussing philanthropy without geographical, conceptual, operational or digital borders, including artificial intelligence.

The School is a member of the European Association of Conservatoires (AEC), which brings together the leading higher education institutions for music in Europe and held the 50<sup>th</sup> Annual European Association of Conservatoires Conference this year. It also participated in the BIME PRO International Music Industry Conference in Bilbao, among other events.

The School is also an active member and member of the Board of Directors of ACESEA (Association of Higher Artistic Education Institutions of Spain), which brings together higher education institutions that teach a range of artistic disciplines.

This year, we also partnered with Cultura en Vena in 'Music as a Balm' in two sessions with mediation.

Furthermore, the School took part in the study and analysis sessions of this committee of experts in the **Think Tank** of the Social Impact Chair (Universidad Pontificia Comillas) for its latest report: **'Proposals for mediation and management of social impact: Managing to maximise impact'.** 







The Sustainable Development Goals (SDG) of the UN 2030 Agenda offer a global framework for sustainable development, to which every organisation can contribute through its actions. Aligned with these principles, the School actively contributes to the SDGs through both its mission and its values and organisational philosophy, integrating these goals in a cross-cutting way into all of its activities.

#### SDG 4: Quality education

The School is a role model in higher music education, ensuring equal access to quality education that boosts its students' employability.

We are a role model in higher music education, ensuring equal access to quality education that boosts its students' employability. With 174 students of 38 nationalities, the School promotes diversity and inclusion. In addition, more than 250 young people have participated in programmes like the Santander Encounter of Music and Academy and the Young Artists Summer Camp. Moreover, 2,911 primary and secondary schoolchildren have benefited from its didactic activities, exposing them to music and expanding their educational opportunities.



#### SDG 10: Reduced inequalities

Our principles for action are rooted in equal opportunities and the elimination of any kind of discrimination, ensuring fair treatment based on merit for all our students and staff.

We actively promote equal opportunities and reduced inequalities, ensuring fair treatment based on merit for all our students and staff. Talent is the only selection criterion for admission, based on open auditions. We offer full tuition scholarships to all students, in addition to accommodation grants (17%) and instrument grants (12%). We also promote inclusion by hiring employees with Asperger syndrome and grant a Summer Camp scholarship to one participant with special educational needs, supporting integration and diversity.



#### SDG 11: Sustainable cities and communities

Cultural development is one of the pillars of the School's mission, which is a springboard for the development and protection of 'Music' in our country.

We promote cultural development as one of the pillars of our mission, acting as a crucial springboard for the

protection and dissemination of music in this country. Through 269 free concerts and 8 at reduced prices for vulnerable groups, the School fosters access to culture and social integration. These concerts are intended for the elderly, schoolchildren and people with physical and mental health issues, promoting inclusion and social sustainability. We also partner with other institutions to strengthen the local community, using music as an instrument of social cohesion and collective well-being. This approach helps create more inclusive and accessible urban settings, generating a positive impact on lives in diverse social groups.

#### SDG 5: Gender equality

Our principles for action are rooted in equal opportunities and elimination of any kind of discrimination, ensuring fair treatment based on merit for all our students and employees.

There are 53 people on our staff, 72% of which are women and 28% men, highlighting the full and effective participation of women in management positions, such as the presidency, general management and the board of directors. Among the student body, 56% are men and 44% are women, reflecting our commitment to equality in education. The School has also implemented a new protocol for workplace and sexual harassment, an inclusive communication protocol and an equality plan, strengthening its commitment to gender equality. These actions help create a safe, inclusive and respectful workplace and educational setting for everyone, promoting a culture of equality at all levels of the institution.



#### SDG 8: Economic growth and decent work

We actively contribute to inclusive and sustainable economic growth by creating jobs and promoting fair labour conditions and a strong culture of human rights.

Out of 53 employees, 100% have a permanent contract, thus ensuring workplace stability and job security. We encourage equal opportunities, as reflected in the diversity in the ages of our employees, supporting cross-generational inclusion in the workplace. Among the alumni community, 85% hold permanent contracts and, despite this stability, 72% diversify their professional activities, integrating numerous artistic disciplines, which not only fosters their personal and professional development but also encourages creativity and innovation, both cornerstones of decent work. This approach reflects the School's commitment to the creation of decent, sustainable jobs, aligned with the principles of the 2030 Agenda for inclusive economic development and improving the labour conditions in the cultural sector.



#### SDG 13: Climate action

The school is taking concrete action and thus playing a leading role in the cultural landscape, as it strives for environmental protection.

The School has accepted its role as a leader in the cultural field with a firm commitment to sustainability and environmental protection. We continue to measure our carbon footprint to identify emissions areas and to apply reduction strategies that help mitigate climate change. This year, thanks to an arrangement with our patron Mahou-San Miguel, we have distributed reusable glass water bottles to all our employees, eliminating the use of disposable plastic and encouraging responsible habits. In addition, we continue to optimise the energy efficiency of our facilities, increasing our contribution to environmental protection and global sustainability.



### SDG 17: Partnerships for the goals

To accomplish our mission and the SDGs, the School fosters strategic partnerships with leading cultural and music institutions, both in Spain and internationally.

The School fosters strategic partnerships with key cultural and music institutions in Spain and internationally, such as the European Association of Conservatoires, Teatro Real, Museo Nacional Thyssen-Bornemisza, Berklee College of Music and the Academy for Impact through Music, to name a few. These partnerships are crucial to our growth and that of the cultural sector. We work closely with more than 200 entities, including our patrons and partners, supporting joint projects that promote an inclusive, transformative cultural model. We also actively participate in initiatives like the Think Tank for the 'Proposals for mediation and management of social impact' report, aligning our mission with the principles of this SDG.

More than 33 years have gone by since H.M. Queen Sofía agreed to lend her name to a School that was still in the early stages. 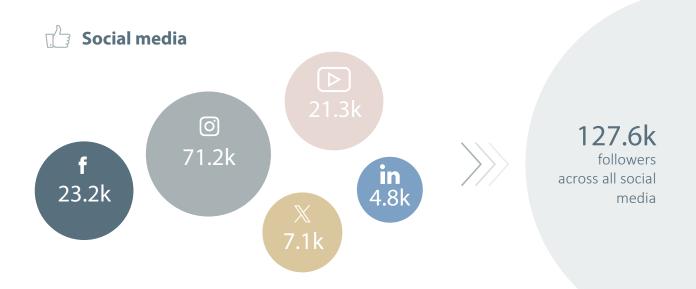
# The School's digital ecosystem

Throughout the 2023-2024 academic year, the School continued its efforts to raise awareness about its activities and impact by carrying out diverse communication initiatives. 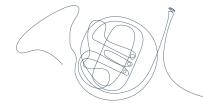

# Transparency and good governance

Corporate responsibility, transparency and good governance are fundamental principles that guide the functioning of institutions committed to sustainable development while generating a positive impact on society. In this regard, the Reina Sofía School of Music has reasserted its commitment to the promotion of an organisational culture that reflects these values in every field of action.

Therefore, during the 2023-2024 academic year, the School continued its efforts to optimise its resource management and to ensure the effectiveness of its activities, bolstering its commitment to the principles of ethical management, efficiency and institutional responsibility.

In turn, Fundación Albéniz, in keeping with these principles, worked to promote access to its institutional information and the outreach of its activities. To this end, it has made a series of key documents available to the public over its website, thus ensuring the utmost transparency in every aspect of its operations. Furthermore, the Foundation has implemented a Whistleblowing Channel in which any member of the community can report potential irregularities or conduct that infringes the established principles while ensuring the whistleblower's protection and confidentiality. Important protocols have also been created, such as the Harassment Prevention Protocol, aimed at ensuring a safe, respectful setting for all members, and the Inclusive **Communication Protocol**, which promotes accessibility and inclusion in all institutional communication.

We continue our efforts to measure our carbon footprint to identify the areas of our activities that generate the most emissions. Based on this information, we look for ways to reduce our emissions, thus helping mitigate climate change and limit global warming.

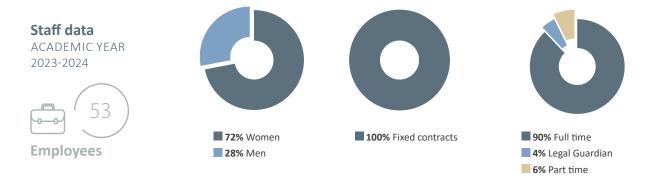

Music, and especially classical music, has proven to be a powerful tool for boosting emotional well-being, reducing stress and promoting social cohesion. Therefore, the project proposes an innovative approach that integrates advanced technology such as digital platforms and virtual reality (VR) to spread classical music in a more accessible way. Furthermore, internal management and event production processes are optimised, improving cultural programming and increasing efficiency in content creation.

The initiative not only seeks to broaden the reach of classical music, but also to offer an emotional support space for vulnerable communities such as youths prone to mental health issues, the elderly suffering loneliness, and people living in rural areas with limited access to cultural resources. By integrating technological tools, a more immersive, tailored and consistent experience between music and the users' well-being is achieved. This approach aims to have a positive influence on citizens' quality of life, while also fostering inclusion and contributing to sustainability.



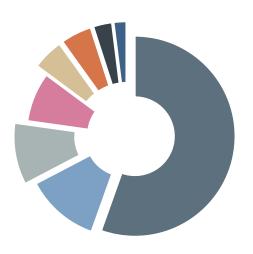

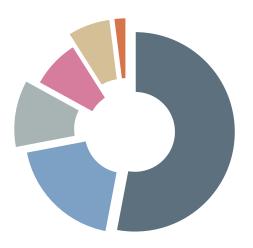

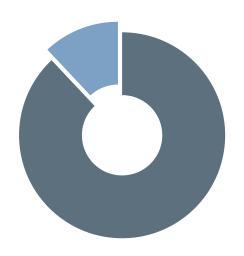

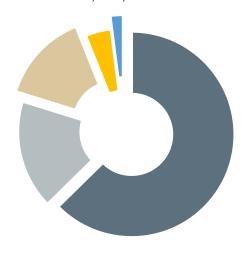

## The School of the Future

### >>> The new building: A meeting point for music

The School, located in Plaza de Oriente since 2008, is currently looking forward to its next big project: expansion into an adjacent building provided by the Ministry of Culture. Boasting more than 4,500 square metres, this expansion will allow us to double our operational space, meaning greater capacity to expand our educational work and increase our cultural and social impact, through new and unique spaces.

The transformation project will be implemented by the prestigious Spanish architecture firm Cruz y Ortiz Arquitectos, founded in 1974, and will combine innovative design, technical precision and sustainability in every detail.

Our goal is to consolidate the School as a meeting point where music and society come together. To do this, we focus on four key factors related to music education, with technology providing the backbone to boost the impact of the project:

- Raising the musical bar: we continue to implement our unique pedagogical model with a view to attracting highly talented young people.
- Developing musical talent in children and youths: we will create a new section focused on musical training for children and youths, fostering their artistic growth.
- Bringing music closer to society: we will promote the values of music, especially among the very young, bringing its transformative power to all sectors of society.
- Creation of a Music Lab: this technology centre for music will become a benchmark in audio-visual technology.
